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President's Message


Fall Is Here

We could certainly accommodate up to 100 members in our hall, and more members would bring in more membership fees to allow payment for professional speakers and better programs and trips. But I'm more concerned with **SURVIVING**. We need to keep getting new members as older members leave due to ill health or moving away to nursing homes. Plants Plus

Share a Hosta

Choose a hosta that's grown too big or is in the wrong spot. Dig all around the hosta in a circle. Lift it onto a tarp for division. Cut it into quarters or pie shapes and pot up.

Part of your hosta may go into a different area of your yard or into a pot. Pot up some for next spring's Plant Sale. **Bring a pot or two to our October meeting to sell.**

Fall is the best time of year to transplant hostas and other perennials.

Hostas look wonderful in pots on a balcony or patio.

When transplanting hostess, dig a hole bigger and deeper than the hosta, add a mix of compost, aged manure, ground bark, mix it around in the hole, plant at the same level as where it grew before. Water in then top up with 1-2" mulch (leave a space around the crown with no mulch). Don't fertilize until spring.

Other plants to divide in the fall, move or pot up:

Other plants to divide in the fall, move or pot up: Astilbe, Bleeding Heart, Iris, Daylily, Lily of the Valley, Peony, Veronica, Shrubs. Clematis (prune back to 12-18", plant crown 3" deep, water in).
