BCCGC Fall Meeting

Report

Melanie Rantucci and Jan Zimmerman attended the Fall Meeting of the BCCGC on a foggy fall day. We took a raffle prize consisting of a basket containing a selection of bulbs including an Amaryllis. We gave out some of our membership brochures and enjoyed the company of North Surrey Horticultural Society and South Surrey Garden Club members.

Reports from the President, Lorna Fraser, 1st VP Cindy Tataryn, Treasurer, Ruby Miller were provided as handouts (attached). The Secretary, Melodie Anderson has stepped down and there was a request for someone to step in, which was fulfilled later in the meeting. For the AGM in April they will be needing a President, 2nd Vice President as well a Communications Coordinator, and a Scholarship Trust Fund trustee.

A Notice of Motion was presented (attached) for voting at the April AGM to amend the Constitution regarding handling of proposed amendments- stating that amendments to the Constitution and or Bylaws shall be presented in writing and distributed by E-Bulletin 60 days prior to any AGM, and any approved amendments should be published in the first Bulletin published after the AGM in which the proposed amendment was presented. It also notes that any amendment needs approval of a motion by two-thirds of votes cast at the meeting or AGM.

Lorna addressed the group and noted that an important current issue is Renewal and Rejuvenation of the Council. The Executive have discussed the following ways to do this, including:

- linkages to members newsletters
- visiting members meetings to get to know them and their clubs better
- co-sponsoring events with member clubs
- sharing tours
- social media
- offering other benefits
- more member engagement
- increasing membership
- focus on inter generational gardeners
- learning tips from various cultures in the region
- providing resources for teachers in the province

Some specific things they are planning include:

- four quarterly meetings, some of which would be outside Metro Vancouver
- Courses in floral arranging, managing flower shows, etc
- Teacher/Educational resources
- Virtual Garden Clubs
- Virtual seed exchange
- You- tube channel
- Member listings for buy/sell/trade/give- away
- Working committee of 2 to 4 emerging gardeners (under age 35)

They ask that member clubs communicate with the Executive to let them know what they would like from BCCGC and they will be sending out an on-line survey for this.

Further to this theme of renewal they are working on revamping their website. They have engaged Tonia Lenk of Ideas in Bloom, a marketing firm, to make the website easier and align it with the goal of appealing to a broader audience. Tonia made a brief presentation about this, explaining it will be done in several phases.

A student who had been a recipient of the Scholarship Trust Fund made a presentation on his research involving stink bugs, which are an increasing problem in the Fraser Valley.

There were three other speakers. Karin England, who works for Metro Vancouver Parks presented information about the need to increase private green spaces in the city. She introduced the group to their website, GrowGreenGuide.ca, that has lots of good ideas and tips to help grow eco-friendly lawns and gardens including free custom garden plans.

Later Andre Bellamy spoke about Growing in Small Spaces and suggested containers, preparation of pots, care of plants, and plants to grown in containers. In the afternoon, Michael Lascelle presented many suggestions for rare fruits that can be grown, mostly in doors, but many in small spaces including dwarf fruit trees.

We enjoyed a lovely luncheon but sadly did not win a door prize. We thank the WRDGC for making it possible for us to enjoy this informative event.

Give Garlic A Rest


Wildflower Garden
